Ancient Greek Course

Below is the Ancient Greek curriculum, structured according to the chapters of the textbook. For ease of reference, the grammatical rules for each chapter are listed, allowing even those unfamiliar with the inductive method to compare the topics covered with those in any standard Greek grammar book. It is, however, important to emphasise that our courses do not involve studying grammar through rote memorisation of declensions and conjugations. Instead, every rule is learned through direct application and fully understood within the context in which it is presented.

Students gain a complete understanding of the morphology of the noun and the morphology of verbs, as well as the syntactical structures of the language and many phraseological constructions.

Students will not only have a comprehensive understanding of Greek grammar, but they will also have mastered the 1800 most frequent words in classical literature. This will enable them to read literary texts in the original language with ease, even those of considerable difficulty. At the end of the course, students read passages from Plato's Symposium in the original text, without any modifications and without using a dictionary.

By the end of the course, students are able to understand, in the original language and through reading alone, literary texts of moderate difficulty. The curriculum also includes reading selected works by some of the most significant authors of classical literature, such as Apollodorus, Euripides and Aesop.
